

Metagovernance: governing of governing

Means by which a society attempts to establish some

degree of coordinated governance.

The goal is to achieve the best possible outcome from the viewpoint of those responsible for the performance of public sector organisations*.

* UfM: increase performance of coordinated and integrated spatial development strategies to achieve sustainable development

The intention is to invite governments to agree on common basic shared values in urban and regional development in such a way that they become accepted norms in the long term.

Institutional learning

This is facilitated by:

- 1. The adoption common definitions
- (e.g. Cities and Towns EC_OECD)
- 2. Collection of comparable data
- 3. Common efforts in capacity building & education
- 4. Formulation of comparable policy frameworks at national (NUPs*) and local (ICDSs**) levels, with utmost respect for national trajectories and traditions.


