How will new industrial technologies and services in the port affect living conditions for all citizens?



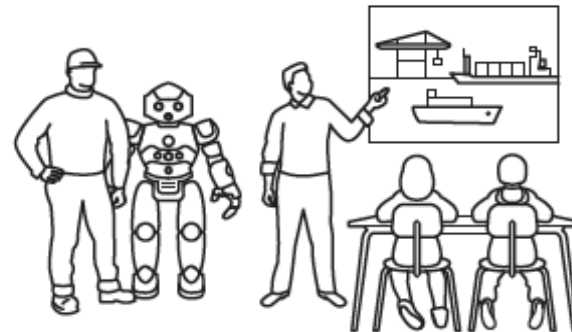
